### Historic Calgary Week SAP Memorial Building

Southern Alberta Pioneers celebrates Historic Calgary Week

Continuing a ten-year partnership with Historic Calgary Week the Southern Alberta Pioneers once more will be involved in presenting four pioneer stories on Friday, July 24, 2015 at 9:45 a.m. at the Memorial Building. This year HCW is celebrating the 25th Anniversary of the beginnings of Historic Calgary Week --- which started modestly as a one-day celebration of the historical aspects of our city, growing to the present day 11 days ----becoming more than what could be worked into the 'week'.

To celebrate this 25th anniversary there will be a special pre-opening program featuring the 1997 PBS documentary "Remembering Calgary" followed by a panel discussion on Thursday, July 23 at 6:30 p.m. at the John Dutton Theatre located in the Central Public Library on 7th Avenue SE in downtown Calgary.

Also special this year is the return of the "History Hunt," a feature of the 1991 program. This year's hunt has 25 questions about written history you can find in Calgary without looking in a book. Participants will be looking for details in locations such as bridges, cornerstones, sidewalk stamps and address signs in some of Calgary's older communities. Watch for entry forms in July, prior to HCW. The whole family --- young and old can take part!

The old favourite, a giant Historic Calgary Crossword will once again appear in the Calgary Herald prior to the beginning of HCW, and also in PDF format at the Chinook Country website.

With over 60 events held in Calgary and surrounding districts of Okotoks, Millarville, Cochrane and High River, the HCW 2015 will be an interesting summer festival of events.

Mark on your calendar: Historic Calgary Week 2015 runs from July 24 to Heritage Day, August 3.

### **History Tidbits**

Nanton was an early stopping place between MacLeod and Calgary. Its original name was Mosquito Creek.

Okotoks, Blackfoot for rock, was so named because of the glacial boulder located five miles west of the town.

A census taken in Calgary in January of 1884 gave the number of residents as 428. It was said that a good number of people were away at the time.

The C.P.R. built the Banff Springs Hotel in 1886, the Chateau at Lake Louise in 1890 and the Palliser Hotel in Calgary in 1912.

In 1910, in Calgary the wages of the street car conductors was 25 cents an hour.

In 1890, the first General Hospital was built; the first nurse to graduate from the General was Miss Marion Moodie, in 1895; the hospital was demolished in October of 1998.

In 1891 the Sisters of Charity established the Holy Cross Hospital; the school of nursing began in 1906 with three students and the last class was in 1979. The Grey Nuns, Sisters of Charity, operated the hospital for 88 years.

### Last Homage Paid George Clift King, First Calgarian

Tribute Paid Pioneer City Postmaster by Community

Sunlight filtered through the stained-glass window of the Pro-Cathedral, grey-haired comrades of many years' standing filled the main body of the church, and flowers in rich profusion banked the chancel when George Clift King, Calgary's first citizen, received the final benediction of the church Saturday afternoon.

The beautiful and moving burial service of the Anglican Church was read by Very Rev. Dean H. R. Ragg, and Venerable Archdeacon Tims, pioneer missionary. His lordship Bishop Sherman pronounced the benediction.

The regimental colors of four battalions hung motionless in the still air as veteran mounted policemen, the city police force, old-timers of the city and surrounding district, and former colleagues of the postal service filed into the church to pay their last tribute to the old North West Mounted Policeman – the first member of the famous force to set foot on the site where the city now stands. A sigh and quiet footsteps along the aisles were the only sounds that broke the stillness as the church filled up. Men preponderated in the two centre sections, reserved for representatives of the Mounted Police, the postal associations and the Southern Alberta Pioneers' and the Old-Timers' organization and, well down in the body of the church the scarlet tunic of a Mounted Police officer was a vivid accent of color, echoed in the jackets of the six stalwart constables of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police who acted as pall bearers.

As 2 o'clock sounded the black-robed clergy, in their white surplices, preceded by the tall gold cross, left the vestry to meet the funeral cortege and the voice of the dean was heard intoning the familiar words. "For he that believeth in Me is not dead, but shall have life everlasting".

Veterans of 1874 proceeding up the centre aisle, the clergy were followed by the honorary pall bearers, a group of veteran Mounted Policemen who, like the man they had gathered to honor for the last time, has played a romantic role in western history. Three, Major Fred Bagley of Banff, Col. James Walker and John Herron of Pincher Creek, were like their dead comrade, veterans of the old force of 1874. R. W. Fletcher and "Peach" Davis, 1876, Col. G. E. Sanders and Arthur Brooke completed the small company. In their wake came the pallbearers, walking slowly in front of the bier. Close relatives followed.

The short and dignified service was over in less than half an hour. There was no funeral oration, and the two hymns chosen were "Peace, Perfect Peace", and "Abide With Me". Dean Fagg read the 90th Psalm, and Ven. Archdeacon Tims the 15th chapter of the Epistle of St. Paul to the Corinthians, in which occur the words: "and this mortal shall put on immortality and death is swallowed up in victory".

Prayers were read by the dean and the solemn benediction given by the bishop. During the singing of the closing hymn 60 letter carriers, the same number of postal clerks and 20 former employees of the postal service under leadership of J. B. Corley, district director of postal services; W. J. Cartwell, representing the post office department at Ottawa, and H. Morgan, president of the Alberta branch of the Canadian Postmasters' Association, filed from the church and proceeded to the Public Building, there to form a double guard of honor through which the cortege passed in front of the post office, closed for a brief space of time as a tribute to the man who held the office of postmaster for 36 of the 60 years he resided here.

Immediate relatives attending the funeral were Mrs. King, two sons, George of Edmonton, and Edward of Calgary, two daughters, Mrs. G. Freeman, Vancouver, and Mrs. L. S. Walker, Calgary.

Many went to the Union cemetery at the close of the church service, where internment took place in the family plot. Banked floral tributes bore mute testimony to the respect and esteem in which the pioneer was held in this community and throughout the west.

### Trivia

n 1968 on 17th avenue S.W. at about 7th street in Calgary, when excavating for the Mona Lisa art gallery, buffalo bones and stone butchering tools were discovered -9 feet below the surface. This indicated a butchering site over 800 years ago.

In the Hawkwood area of Calgary arrowheads have been found along with other artifacts in Parkdale, PointMacKay, BowBottom and Strathcona Park.

Twice a year the Black foot tribe loaded their pack horses with buffalo robes, dried meat and furs and made their way to Rocky Mountain House and Edmonton - they purchased knives, kettle, power, shot and then returned to the foothills south of the Bow River.

Calgary offered one of the best river crossings for many miles and provided shelter in the winter, summer breezes were a relief from the heat as well as protection from the mosquitos.

In the late 1800's the Stoneys did not camp any closer to Calgary than Cochrane. The Sarcees were closer to Rocky Mountain House and Buffalo Lake. It was the Peigans that claimed Calgary area and then moved south to the Missouri River. The Bloods have been known to have wintered at the Bow and Elbow rivers however usually the Black foot known today as the Siksika Nation.
