President's Message

Thank you for giving me the privilege of being your President for 2006. I am looking forward to meeting and working with many of you in the upcoming year. Some of you will know much of the following, but new members may not, therefore......

Our Memorial Building Opened June 8, 1955

Sitting on a bluff above the Elbow River, with a commanding view of all south Calgary and the magnificent Rocky Mountains to the west, is the Memorial Building of the Southern Alberta Old Timers. The site of our building is also a historical one as it is just above the old ford on the Elbow River, which was used by the first settlers upon arrival in Calgary. With its roots as deep as our province, this 2,400 square foot building contains some of the city's most important historical records, photos and memories, yet few Calgarians know its events. This is the home of the Southern Alberta Pioneers and Their Descendants - a group that was formed in the early 1900s. The mandate of the Association is to collect and preserve information, pictures and artifacts on the early settlement of the province and of the families who broke the ground.

The front of the site is marked by a large "Memorial Gate", built to celebrate Canada's centennial year. The archway bears, on its easterly face, two plaques – one a simple dedication to our pioneers and the other a listing of the signatories of Treaty No. 7 in tribute to the Indian people who originally occupied these lands. The westerly face of the archway bears plaques perpetuating in bronze the names of 1,050 of the heads of original Pioneer Families settling in Southern Alberta before the end of 1890.

Our building is full of history and it is a lovely place to visit. It is even more fun to discover in person, by your attendance at a social function, where you could experience all of this in person. We look forward to meeting you at some future date.

2006 Calgary Exhibition & Stampede Picture Display

On November 3, 2005 a letter was dispatched to the Vice President of the Calgary Exhibition and Stampede stating that The Southern Alberta Pioneers and Their Descendants valued their longstanding association with the Calgary Exhibition and Stampede and expressed the Board's appreciation of the space provided annually for our booth in the Roundup Centre.

It was pointed out that the area assigned for the 2005 array, the best ever, enabled us to display a total of 324 items such as mounted and captioned photographs, some short text features and a few pertinent maps. The final arrangement, placed on 32 panels, provided excellent viewing for the visiting public without creating a bottleneck to the adjacent traffic flow. The remaining space proved adequate to display two units from the Remington Carriage Museum.

A request for the same 48 by 24 foot location in the Roundup Centre for the 2006 Southern Alberta Pioneers exhibit was presented along with the speculation that our booth would be essentially of the same configuration, displaying a slightly larger and more varied look at Alberta history, events, locations and people. In addition, we reported that a request to The Remington Carriage Museum has been submitted for the Large "Red Concord Stagecoach" to be made available for our show.

It is premature to expect replies to our request for display space at The Roundup Centre and another for the use of the Large "Red Concord Stagecoach" from the Remington Museum. However, at this time



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we must be prepared to forge ahead on the assumption that these wishes will be granted.

Today, January, 3, 2006, is just over six months away from the opening of the 2006 Calgary Exhibition and Stampede. And in order to be deserving of the space and equipment provided we must strive to provide a diverse, interesting and slightly varied theme or method of displaying the material we have available.

For 2006 we have considered adding a series of early 1900s home pictures that display interesting architecture of the period. Many of the homes presented would be dwellings owned by families who went on to become "The Southern Alberta Pioneers and their Descendants". Our picture source is in the form of a printed booklet featuring pictures of dwellings and businesses and just enough information to identify each building.

Now comes the need for helping hands. Deciding which homes to feature and researching information pertaining to each home is vital. Composing text and using that information to make interesting and informative captions becomes a vital part of the project. Digitizing pictures, downloading them into our computer, cropping images, inserting text, printing and mounting same on foamcore all takes time.

We anticipate recruiting assistance from the Historical Committee to accomplish the research, but the skills required to manage some of the computer operations may have to be recruited from members of our association who, at this time, are unknown to us. Perhaps there is someone reading this article, who can work with Adobe Photo Deluxe on on a Power Macintosh G3 computer.

Born on the Site of Old Fort Macleod in 1847 – Louis Watson

From The Lethbridge Daily Herald, June 21, 1924

Watson was born in 1847, on the Island which years later became the home of western civilization – old Fort Macleod. He was born to a life of adventure and hazard in the heart of a land teeming with herds of wild life and hostile Indians.

"My earliest recollections are of vast herds of buffalo, elk, deer and antelope roaming over the country. There were terrible Indian wars in those early days and our lives were in constant danger. We lived among the Indians, subsisting on buffalo meat chiefly. For butter we used to grind up the buffalo bones, boil them until the grease came to the top. We would skim this grease and place it in a buffalo's bladder and use it for butter. It was mighty good," said Louis. "We used to eat a great deal of pemmican. This is buffalo meat ground very fine and fried. We used to pound it with rocks and axes. We raised a sort

of barley, which we ground between rocks. This barley flour made a sort of black bread, which we washed down with water, the hulls sticking in our throats.

"The first white traders came from Montana. They brought with them old flintlock guns that we secured in exchange for our furs. "I also remember the coming of the early Hudson's Bay traders. The Hudson's Bay traders gave the Indians their first taste of whiskey and tobacco. They were afraid of this at first, thinking it was poison, but after a while they learned to like it. Yes, they would even kill for firewater. Whiskey did much to degrade the Indian.

"I remember seeing Louis Riel in the Yellowstone Country across the line. He was a tall man with a heavy beard. His daughter, Bouteas, was cooking for him. He was associated with a band of half-breeds at the time.

"I met Capt. Walsh at Fort Walsh and remember outwitting the Sioux there. The Sioux were camped five miles from the fort. One night they stole my best buffalo horses. I was determined to get revenge and planned a visit to their camp. I set out across the prairie, the fires of the Indian Camp lighting up the sky. As I drew near, I could hear the hideous war songs of the braves as the celebrated a victory over the Blood Indians and the capture of my horses. Bent on getting full revenge, I crept into their camp and secured a couple of good-looking animals. Daybreak found me back at Fort Walsh with two splendid horses. The officers were amazed that I came back at all to tell the tale.

"I was in Macleod when Col. Macleod and the police arrived in 1874. The Indians began to get more peaceful, the wild life began to disappear in the mountains or to the far north or south and white settlers started to come in.

"This marked the beginning of a new period in the history of this country."
