



## The Travels of Ofeigur Sigurdsson and Astridur Tomasdottir

Ofeigur Sigurdsson and Astridur Tomasdottir, new Icelandic immigrants, traveled in June of 1889 on foot and by ox cart over a muddy, bumpy path from Calgary to the settlement of Icelanders near the Medicine River northwest of Innisfail. It took four days to get to the Red Deer River from Calgary. There were no bridges in those days so they had to float their ox cart across the river and coax the horses to swim across. Neither Ofeigur or Astridur could swim, but they made that crossing safely.

By the spring of 1891, Ofeigur, Astridur and little Rooney (or Gudrun as she was christened) had been settled for two years in the Tindastoll district. They had found a piece of land on the N.E. Quarter of Section 10 Township 37 Range 1 West of the 5th Meridian. They worked to put up a log cabin using the timber that they could cut in the vicinity. Soon baby Tomas was born.

According to the Census of Icelanders compiled by Baldwin Baldwinson in 1891–92, they had one acre of broken land under roots and vegetables, three cows, seven young cattle, six sheep, 10 poultry, the value of their lands, buildings etc. was \$900.00, their capital at commencement had been \$150.00 and their net worth was said to be \$1,180.00.

To earn some cash to support his new farm, Ofeigur would use the skills that he brought over from his homeland. He was an excellent shepherd and sheep shearer. Luckily for Ofeigur and his fellow Icelanders, there were large sheep ranches in the Nose Creek Valley near Airdrie, where they could get work as shepherds. The only way to travel there was on foot, and it took at least four days in each direction. The men would be away for months at a time, leaving the women at home to tend to the children and run the farm.

This new land was vast. The milk cow could wander miles away when there were no fences, and she did. Astridur would ride their faithful buckskin pony Blake across the prairie, listening for the sound of the bell around the cow's neck. Sometimes she had to travel up to seven miles away to find the milk cow.

In those early years Ofeigur would leave in the spring and not come back until fall. He came on foot all the way to the sheep ranches near Airdrie. Along the way, he came across bears, coyotes and wolves, which were known to roam across the prairie in those days. Likely he saw more on the way south to Airdrie, for on the way home he was burdened with his pay in the form of groceries; bags of flour, sugar and coffee. He had to lean forward to balance the load on his back.

When he arrived, Ofeigur Sigurdsson set a record of 106 sheep sheared in a day. The next job was to journey with the sheep over the prairie, fattening them up on the fine prairie grasses and clovers.

Living as a shepherd, he walked across the land herding the sheep, taking shelter where he could under rocks, and in caves along creek beds and water ways. He had to know how to find food, how to ward off predators and how to survive in the great outdoors. He fed on the plentiful berries that he could find in summer.

Late one summer Ofeigur was caught in a fierce snowstorm. Deciding to stay with the sheep so that he might keep them alive, and not take shelter in his cave, he found that he began to suffer from the cold. Before the storm was over he had found it necessary to slaughter four sheep and wrap their warm pelts around his body to prevent himself from freezing to death. He sacrificed the lives of a few to keep watch over many more. He gave thanks to the animals who kept him alive.

After four long months, Ofeigur came home to his family. What relief they must have felt to be together again. He made this journey south for the first two or three summers (1889–1892) and then had little further need to earn cash so far away from home. Ofeigur Sigurdsson was a clever farmer and soon made it so that his own family farm could support him. This had not been possible in his homeland for many long years. How fortunate he felt to have adopted Canada as his new home.

Meet at the Carriage House Inn, 9030 Macleod Trail South, Calgary. This tour is subject to cancellation if registration does not reach a minimum.

SAP members have been asking for a tour such as this, and through the co-operation of HSA and CCHS the Pioneer membership is able to take part. The fee is \$60 including a delicious bag lunch, commentary en route, admission, interpretive film and guided tour at this premier tourist

attraction, earning kudos since its opening in 2007.

the 'Little Synagogue' project; Japanese Canadians in Southern Alberta; Danish Communities; Community, Work and Race in the Crowsnest; and A British City in the Edwardian Age. Especially interesting will be presentations at the Chinese Cultural Centre in downtown Calgary and the awards banquet at the Wainwright Hotel in Heritage Park. A very special program will feature the Black Pioneer Heritage Singers – a presentation not to be missed.

# Morley / Banff Tour

Anumber of members of the Southern Alberta Pioneers took part in a special tour of Morley McDougall Mission church and Banff on Saturday, September 27, 2008.

Organized by the Chinook Country Historical Society, with publicity support from the Southern Alberta Pioneers, there were other participants from McDougall Stoney Mission Society, the Native Calgarian Society and those who learned about the tour through brochures distributed during Historic Calgary Week. At McDougall Stoney Mission church at Morley, the 47 participants were greeted with refreshments before a presentation was made inside the historic 1875 building. McDougall Stoney Mission Society President, Gerald McDougall, welcomed the guests and explained the plans that the society is making for greater historical emphasis to be placed on the Morleyville settlement and the church.

The presentation first dealt with the importance of the 'ancient highways/ crossroads, several of which crossed at the Morley site, the early explorers and the missionary Robert Rundle. In the 1870s the McDougall missionaries, father

George and son, John, came to the area to minister to the Stoney people, and David, another son, to establish a ranch and trading post. David and his wife, Annie MacKenzie, had a daughter, Georgina, who married Norman Luxton, and they had one daughter, Eleanor. Additional mention was made of other special people at the Morleyville Settlement: Elizabeth Chantler McDougall, Andrew Sibbald, Elizabeth Barrett, Jacob Good Stoney, Walking Buffalo, John Laurie, and the Northwest Mounted Police detachment.

The lives of David and Annie, along with Georgina and Norman, are part of the display that was viewed later at the Whyte Museum of the Canadian Rockies in Banff. (Note: This display remains available at the Museum until October 2009)

Guides at the Whyte Museum provided the tours of displays: The Group of Seven to Takao Tanabe and The Stuff of Legend: The Luxton Family in Banff and the Bow Valley that focused on the David McDougall and the Luxton families.

Following this viewing, participants were given the choice of using the Heritage Passport to visit the rustic museum of

early natural history (1902-03) at Banff Park Museum to learn about the beginnings of Canada's national parks at the Cave and Basin National Historic site. Some also toured the former Norman Luxton store, "Sign of the Goat," now relocated from Banff Avenue to the south end of the Bow River bridge. Continuing from here, many participants toured the Buffalo Nations Luxton Museum along the riverside. Others in the group took time to visit the art galleries in Banff and to walk through the cemetery to visit gravesites of Tom Wilson and Minnie McDougall Wilson, the Brewsters, Harmons, and the Luxtons.

A great deal of history – ancient, 18th and 19th century, and present time – was presented during the day. With the completion of the tour, many commented that Chinook Country Historical Society fulfilled its mandate to provide the public with opportunities to learn more about southern Alberta people and events, and that membership from the participating organizations had an opportunity to get to know persons with similar interests in southern Alberta history.
